Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Easter Sunday, God again breaks into our darkness with the message of the risen Christ. This year Easter falls on April first. "April Fools Day" has long be celebrated as a day for good humor, harmless pranks and practical jokes.

Paul uses the words "foolishness" and "fools" several times in his letters to the Corinthian church. In 1 Corinthians 1:15 we read, "For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." In the same chapter, verse 21, we read, "For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe." In verse 23, "but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles." In 1 Corinthians 3:18, Paul writes, "Do not deceive yourselves. If you think that you are wise in this age, you should become fools so that you may become wise." Then in 4:10, "We are fools for the sake of Christ, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute."

As "fools" for Christ, we celebrate with the "foolish" Easter message that brings Christ's forgiving light to those trapped in the darkness of guilt and shame.

Attempts to blend different and distinct holidays is not a good idea as it can be confusing. One of my favorite jokes (an old joke I first heard at Bible camp forty years ago) goes like this: Three Lutheran pastors were comparing which American holiday they liked the best. The first pastor said, "My favorite American holiday is Thanksgiving. It's such a patriotic day, with parades and fireworks as we remember the signing of the Declaration of Independence and honor our nation's birth."

The second Lutheran pastor said, "You've got your holidays mixed up. That's not Thanksgiving. You're talking about the Fourth of July. Thanksgiving is in November, you fool. My favorite American holiday is Christmas, because at Christmas we remember those soldiers who have died for our country, we honor all our fallen heroes with flowers on their graves and many people consider it to be the true beginning of summer."

The third Lutheran pastor said, "You've got your holidays mixed up, too. You're not talking about Christmas, that's Memorial Day. You're a fool yourself. My favorite holiday is Easter, because Jesus, whose birth we celebrate at Christmas, lived his life as our savior and died on the cross on Good Friday. He was dead and buried, but the sun was shining brightly on that first Easter morning as the stone was rolled away and Jesus stepped out of the tomb, saw his shadow and it meant six more weeks of winter."

I repeat, that was a joke and should not be considered as any basis of theological argument. My favorite April Fools prank was one I did a few years ago at the previous congregation I served as pastor. Unlike this year, it wasn't Easter, merely a regular Sunday in Lent that happened to fall on April first. I have owned a bright red surfboard since my youth in California. It is over six feet long. At the start of worship that Sunday, I entered the sanctuary carrying my surfboard under my arm and propped it against the wall directly behind the pulpit. Throughout the service I tried not to look at it. I did not use it as a sermon illustration or make reference to it in any way during the service. During the singing of the last hymn, I picked it up and carried it out of the sanctuary. Naturally, after the service had ended, several people asked me why surfboard was there. No, there was no reason other than it was an April Fools prank.

Please come to worship this Easter. I promise

you no surfboard pranks this year. There will be the honest, life changing message of the gospel of Christ. Jesus truly did rise from the tomb and that resurrection continues to change our lives today.
